



National Statistics Omnibus Survey - Technical Report April 2005

1. The sample

Interviews are conducted with approximately 1,800 adult individuals (aged 16 or over) in private households in Great Britain each month. The Omnibus Survey uses the Postcode Address File (PAF) of “small users” as its sampling frame. The PAF is known to have higher coverage of private households than any other available frame. A new sample of 67 postal sectors is selected for each month and is stratified by: region; the proportion of households where the household reference person is in the National Statistics Socio-economic Classification (NS-SEC) categories 1 to 3 (i.e. employers in large organisations; higher managerial occupations; and higher professional employees/self-employed); and the proportion of people who are aged over 65. The postal sectors are selected with probability proportionate to size and, within each sector, 30 addresses (delivery points) are selected randomly.

If an address contains more than one household, the interviewer uses a standard ONS procedure to randomly select just one household. Within households with more than one adult member, just one person aged 16 or over is selected with the use of a Kish Grid. The interviewers endeavour to interview that person - proxy interviews are not taken.

2. Weighting the data

Weighting factors are applied to Omnibus data to correct for unequal probability of selection caused by interviewing only one adult per household, or restricting the eligibility of the module to certain types of respondent.

The weighting system also adjusts for some non-response bias by calibrating the Omnibus sample to ONS population totals. Despite the considerable efforts made by interviewers to maximize response rates, approximately 35% of selected individuals decline to take part or cannot be contacted. Differential non-response among key subgroups in the population is especially problematic because it can result in biased estimates being produced.

In order to compensate for differential non-response, the Omnibus sample is divided into weighting classes of age-group by sex and Government Office Region. The number of people belonging to each sub-group in the population is provided by ONS. The weighting ensures that the weighted sample distribution across regions and across age-sex groups matches that in the population.

Consequently, respondents belonging to sub-groups that are prone to high levels of non-response are assigned higher weights. For example, young males living in London have a lower response rate and are therefore assigned higher weights than are males living in other regions.

Grossing up the data by age and sex and by region to ONS population totals will reduce the standard errors of survey estimates if the survey variable is correlated with age, sex and region.

2.1 Using weighted data

Both the design weights and the final weights are re-scaled so that the weighted sample size equals the unweighted size (i.e. the number of responding individuals).

If a module of questions applied only to a sub-group of the population, for example eligibility was restricted by age, or the module was asked only in England, the weight for the module is calculated for that sub-group and the sample size, for the weighted data, scaled back to the un-weighted figure.

When conducting statistical significance tests, using weighted data, the un-weighted sample should be used. For tests on the total (module) population the base total shown in the tables should be used. However, if sub-groups of the total (module) population are created, for example sub-groups in terms of sex, age-group, region etc., the base shown is the weighted base for that sub-group - because the weight was generated for the whole (module) population. Therefore, when conducting statistical significance tests on these sub-groups, the un-weighted base for the sub-group should be used - this can be found by running tables, etc. without applying the weight - in conjunction with the weighted data.

2.2. Calculation of the Design Weight

The first stage of the weighting procedure involves producing a design weight that corrects for unequal probability of selection caused by interviewing only one adult per household, or restricting the eligibility of the module to certain types of respondent.

i. Unit of analysis: Household

On occasions, a module may collect information about the household rather than the individual and the appropriate unit of analysis will be the household rather than the individual. For example, the questions might be concerned with details about the accommodation which could be supplied by any adult member of the household. In this case, no design weight is required because the information is collected from every household in the responding sample.

ii. Weight A - Unit of analysis: Individual

Because only one household member is interviewed, people in households containing few adults have a greater chance of selection than those in households with more. Weight A is applied to correct for this unequal probability, and is calculated by dividing the number of adults in the sampled household by the average number of adults per household. The base is then adjusted back to the number of respondents who were interviewed. Weight A is applied to modules which use the individual adult as the unit of analysis.

iii. Weight C - Unit of analysis: Household Reference Person or spouse

Sometimes information about the household is required that can only be supplied reliably by the household reference person or their spouse/partner. The probability that the selected respondent will be eligible for the module will be $2/n$ or $1/n$ (where n is the number of adults in the household): if the Household Reference Person (HRP) is married/cohabiting the probability that the selected respondent will be eligible is $2/n$, if the HRP is not married/cohabiting the probability is $1/n$. The weighting factor corrects for unequal probability of selection and then adjusts the base back to that of the actual number of respondents that complete the module.

2.3 Calibrating the Omnibus Sample to ONS Population Totals

After the initial design weights have been produced, the data is calibrated to ONS population totals. The calibration factors are produced by the GREG method, implemented in GES (software written in SAS). This method is a generalisation of standard post-stratification that produces weights that adjust to more than one margin.

2.4 Derivation of the Final Weights

In the final stage of the weighting procedure, the design weight is multiplied by the calibration factor.

i. Indwgt

The final individual weight (Indwgt) is the product of Weight A and the Individual Calibration Factor.

ii. Hhwgt

The final household weight (Hhwgt) is the product of Weight C and the Household Calibration Factor.

The design weights and the final weights are supplied in each survey month.

2.5 Effective Sample Size

This method of sampling and the consequent weighting affect the sampling errors of the survey estimates. The effect can be shown by calculating the Effective Sample Size which gives the size of an equal probability sample which is equivalent in precision to the unequal probability sample actually used. The Effective Sample Size will vary slightly from one month to another with the proportions of interviews in different sized households. On average the Effective Sample Size of the Omnibus Survey is 84% to 86% of the actual sample of individuals, when Weight A is applied. An achieved sample of 1800 individual adults in the Omnibus Survey is equivalent to an equal probability sample of about 1500.

Where individuals are interviewed as representing their households and no weighting is needed, there is no reduction in precision. Where questions relating to the household are addressed only to the Household Reference Person (HRP) or the spouse of the HRP and Weight C is applied, the Effective Sample Size is 86% to 87% of the interviewed sample. The proportion of households in which the selected respondent is the HRP or spouse has varied between 82% and 95% so the sample size for this kind of module will be about 1500 if the total sample is 1800. The Effective Sample Size will be about 1450.

3. Sampling errors

The Omnibus is a sample survey and thus estimates are subject to sampling variability. Sampling variability is dependent on several factors, including the size of the sample, clustering and the effect of weighting on the variable of interest. Standard errors, which give an indication as to the amount that a given estimate deviates from a true population value, are supplied for all variables. The sampling errors are provided on an Excel spreadsheet.

4. Field Work

All interviews are carried out face-to-face by members of the general field force of interviewers trained to carry out National Statistics surveys. Advance letters are sent to all addresses, prior to the interview, giving a brief account of the survey. The interviewing period starts during the last two weeks of the month and continues into the first two weeks of the following month. Interviewers call at all the selected addresses unless a refusal has been made beforehand in response to the advanced letter. The interviewer makes at least three calls at an address at different times of the day and week before coding the household as a non-contact.

As with all National Statistics surveys, a quality check on field work is carried out through recall interviews with a proportion of respondents to make sure that the interviews actually took place with those respondents and that responses to questions are consistent.

5. Calculation of Response Rate

The small users' Postcode Address File includes some business addresses and other addresses, such as new and empty properties, at which no private households are living. The expected proportion of such addresses, which are classified as ineligible, is about 9-10%. They are eliminated from the set sample before response rates are calculated.

5.1 Response Rate for April 2005

The response rate is calculated as the number of achieved interviews as a percentage of the eligible sample.

The response rate for April was 69% as shown below:

6. Output contained in the report

6.1 Frequency counts

Frequency counts for the classificatory variables and client questions are provided, showing non-response to individual questions (item non-response).

Item non-response occurs for three reasons:

- a. the respondent was not eligible for the question and they were routed past the question.
- b. the respondent was unable to answer (did not know) the question.
- c. the respondent refused to answer the question.

6.2 Tables

Each table is based on the sample answering both the client question and the relevant classificatory question so both the base and the percentages in the total column may vary slightly from one table to another. Percentages are rounded to the nearest whole number.

Tables based on questions that allow more than one answer to be given (multiple response questions) contain all the responses given by the respondent. The percentages in the table may therefore add up to more than 100% because respondents may give more than one answer.

Some bases within tables are very small. The confidence intervals surrounding percentages calculated on bases of 30 cases or less will be very large and we would advise that such results are reported with a great deal of caution.

6.3 Classificatory variables

The module variable names are related to the program question numbers. Module variables are prefixed with M. The classification variables use names. These follow Social and Vital Statistics Division standards for surveys wherever possible.

You should run through the questionnaire using training cases before starting fieldwork, and this may give you a clearer idea of the overall average length of interviews. Remember to also make allowance for introductions and conclusions after interview.

If you experience difficulties with the times allowed, contact the Field Office without delay.

You should claim the *actual* time spent **up to** these maxima.

- Up to 3 hours to read 2005-6 Annual Instructions. (*Only may be claimed once on your first Omnibus quota in the survey year April to March.*)
- Up to 1½ hours to read these monthly instructions and work through training cases.
- Up to 2 hours to prepare for your quota.

Names of household members

This month on the Omnibus we are going to try to use the names of household members to evaluate the accuracy of a name and address register. It is quite important that you record the names of household members accurately – but only if the respondent gives the information without being asked for it. We do **not** want you to probe for names as we are aware that many respondents choose not to give their name.

For example, in many cases, interviewers use shortened versions of names in the household block. A house with Ethel, Peter and Derek O'Neill might just have E, P and D entered in the names field. This month we would like you to enter the full names, as they are given, **if** this information is given – so you might enter 'Ethel', 'Ethel O'Neill' or 'Mrs O'Neill' depending on how the respondent described her. The questions asked in this module may be upsetting for some respondents. The module is not compulsory and people have the right to choose not to answer these questions. When asking respondents whether they wish to answer these questions try to ensure that other household members are not present.

Completion is by the respondent via the laptop. However, there will be situations where the respondent is unable to use the computer themselves and will give you permission to administer the section yourself.

All respondents are eligible for this module.



Before you hand the laptop to the respondent please press F2 to save the data you have already entered.

Why is this module self-completion via the laptop?

Self-completion via the laptop is a way of getting reliable data from respondents when modules cover sensitive topics. Because no-one else can see the answers the respondent gives they can be more open about their attitudes and feel less obliged to give what they may think is the 'right' answer.

Introducing the module

There is an introduction to the module on the screen which assumes that the respondent will be happy to complete the module straight onto the laptop - add more to this as you feel necessary in order to reassure the respondent.

In most cases offering self-completion on the laptop will be quite straightforward as people are accustomed to using laptops/PCs at work or at home, as well as computerised toys. Where it is obvious that it would not be suitable for the respondent to use the laptop e.g. very bad eyesight, physical problems with their hands, or you suspect they cannot read, you can still read out the introduction and add "or I can carry on asking the questions".

Self-completion via the laptop

Interviewers have suggested that for self-completion modules it is best to try and sit beside or near respondents, so that they can ask your help without it being conspicuous. Your sitting near them also helps to stop anyone else seeing their answers - it can make it easier for you and them.

Once the respondent has agreed to do self-completion via the laptop, hand the laptop to them and they will then go through the module themselves, entering their answers straight into it.

Make sure that you have stuck your yellow and blue dots onto the ENTER and '0' (zero) keys, respectively. These dots are sent with the Field materials attached to your contents list and should be stuck on BEFORE you go into the field.

Most respondents will have already completed the contraception module. They can choose again here whether to complete the questions themselves or to have you ask the questions out loud. If they choose self-completion they are directed to the practice questions only if they haven't already done these before the contraception questions.

If they are directed to the two practice questions, you should work through these questions with respondents to make sure that they understand how to complete the module. They will then be given instructions on how to proceed on the screen as they go through the module (e.g. "Enter your answer and then press ENTER to continue").

Interviewer asks the questions

The only situations when it might be more appropriate for you to ask the questions are:

- ◇ Respondent unable to use the keyboard
- ◇ Respondent unable to read
- ◇ Respondent has sight problems
- ◇ Respondent is distressed at the thought of using the laptop

If you are going to ask the questions it is important that you and the respondent feel comfortable with them. This can be achieved by reading the questions and answer categories out loud (if possible tape yourself doing this) **before going into the field**. This practice session will make you used to hearing yourself saying the questions and make you feel more at ease in the interview situation.

M369_1 - Asks whether respondent has/has had cancer.

M369_2 - Asks whether anyone in respondents immediately family has had cancer.

M369_3 – Opinion questions.

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Client: Health and Safety Executive

Target Group: All employees and those self-employed people who work as if they were employed.

Opinion Questions: All except, M346_29 and M346_30

This module is being asked on behalf of researchers at the Health and Safety Executive (HSE).

Purpose of the module

The HSE define stress as “**the adverse reaction people have to excessive pressure or other types of demand placed on them**”. Pressure in itself is not necessarily bad and many people thrive on it – it is when pressure is experienced as excessive by an individual that ill health can result.

Work-related stress is a serious problem for organisations. Tackling it effectively can result in significant benefits for organisations. There are things organisations can do to prevent and control work-related stress.

This module is being asked to assess the way people work and their levels of job related stress. The same topic was covered in a March 2004 module, but there have been a number of question changes and additions for this month.

M346_Sem This question asks those who have said that they are self-employed whether they work as if they were an employee. Some self-employed people may work like employees, for example they may work for the same company for a long period of time, be managed by employees of that company and work with others in that company as work colleagues.

M346_1 - M346_19 These questions ask respondents to rate how often the conditions they work under means that they are subject to pressure or stress, whether help is available, the amount of control they have over what they do, and whether they understand their work tasks.

Client: NHS cancer screening

Target Group: Women aged 40 to 74 years

Features: Self completion offered

Opinion Questions: M368_13

Purpose of the module

The NHS is interested in women's use of cancer screening services, in particular breast cancer screening and cervical cancer screening. The module also asks about the use of Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT).

This module is to be completed by self-completion via the laptop. However, there will be situations where the respondent is unable to use the computer themselves and will give you permission to administer the section yourself.



Before you hand the laptop to the respondent please press F2 to save the data you have already entered.

Introducing the module

There is an introduction to the module on the screen which assumes that the respondent will be happy to complete the module straight onto the laptop - add more to this as you feel necessary in order to reassure the respondent.

In most cases offering self-completion on the laptop will be quite straightforward as people are accustomed to using laptops/PCs at work or at home, as well as computerised toys. Where it is obvious that it would not be suitable for the respondent to use the laptop e.g. very bad eyesight, physical problems with their hands, or you suspect they cannot read, you can still read out the introduction and add "or I can carry on asking the questions". As this module deals with sensitive topics (including the menopause, hysterectomies) you should be very sensitive when asking the questions.

The respondent also has the option of refusing this module altogether. Obviously, we would prefer that this option was not used, but in some cases you may come across people who are very reluctant to discuss this kind of thing for personal or cultural reasons, and you should respect their wishes. Women may be especially reluctant to answer these questions with a male interviewer.

If the respondent has agreed to do self-completion via the laptop, hand the laptop to them and they will then go through the module themselves, entering their answers straight into it.

Make sure that you have stuck your yellow and blue dots onto the ENTER and '0' (zero) keys, respectively. These dots are sent with the Field materials attached to your contents list and should be stuck on BEFORE you go into the field.

You should work through the first two questions with respondents to make sure that they understand how to complete the module. They will then be given instructions on how to proceed on the screen as they go through the module (e.g. "Enter your answer and then press the yellow button [Enter] to continue").

- M368_1** Asks respondents if they have ever had a mammogram.
- M368_2** If respondents have had a mammogram, then they are asked which year they last had one.
- M368_2b** If they can remember the month, then this is entered here. There are also options for if they don't know, which include 'later in the year' and 'earlier in the year' – this is so we can get a rough idea, if possible.
- M368_3** Asks for the reason why they had a mammogram, such as a routine screening or a referral. If they say 'other' then they will be asked to type in the other reason.
- M368_4** Asks respondents if they have had a cervical screening.
- M368_5** If they have had a cervical screening, then they are asked which year they last had one.
- M368_5b** The month is entered here, with the same options for the mammogram question, M368_2b.
- M368_6** Asks respondents if they have had a hysterectomy.
- M368_7** If they have had a hysterectomy, they are asked how old they were when they had the operation.
- M368_8** Asks if they have had their menopause (also known as 'the change'). As well as yes/no answer options, there is also an option 'currently experiencing menopause'.
- M368_8a** If respondents answer that they don't know whether or not they have had the menopause, or that they are currently experiencing it, they are asked if their periods have stopped.
- M368_9** If their periods have stopped then they are asked how old they were when they had their final period.
- M368_10** Asks if they have ever taken HRT. After the answer to this, an instruction will appear telling the respondent to hand back the laptop if they are self completing.

- M368_11a** If the respondent has ever taken HRT, this asks if they are currently taking any of the brands listed on card C368_11. Please type in the first few letters of the name of the HRT – the next field will help you code it. If they are not taking HRT, type 'not', and if they are taking a brand not listed, type 'other'.
- M368_11b** Pressing the space bar should bring up several options in a coding frame. Please be careful to select the right one as many types of HRT have very similar names.
- M368_12** If the respondent has taken HRT before but is not currently taking it, this question asks when they stopped taking it.
- M368_12b** Asks for the month in the same way as for 2b and 5b.
- M368_13** The clients are interested in people's perceptions of the risk of developing cancer. This question asks respondents at which age-group they think women are more likely to get breast cancer.
- M368_14a&b** Respondents who answered 'no' earlier to having a hysterectomy, and who have not been through the menopause, are asked if they are using any of the oral contraceptives shown on card C368_14. Those routed to this question will then be asked to hand the laptop back to you. Please enter the first few words of the contraceptive brand name and then code it accurately at the next screen, in the same way as HRT coding at M368_11. Please be careful to select the right one as many types of contraceptives have very similar names.

Client: Pensions Commission

Target Group: Men under 65 and women under 60 (working age), or older people if they are still in paid work.

Opinion Questions: M373_1, M373_2, M373_8, M373_10, M373_11, M373_23

The Pensions Commission are interested in people's planning for retirement, and their expectations of retirement. These questions go to everyone of working age, or older people who are still working. This means you are likely to encounter some people who feel these questions do not apply to them – young people at the start of their working lives, or older people who are semi-retired and work part-time. The clients are aware that these people may find the questions difficult but they would still like all the routed questions to be asked, as there will be some young people who have thought about pensions issues and some older people who are able to answer the questions. If your respondent says that the questions don't make sense for their life, please explain why you are asking them, but if the respondent cannot answer then please code as 'don't know'. We would rather have a 'don't know' answer than a complete guess. However, please read out every question – do not assume the respondent will not be able to answer.

- M373_1** 'Introduction' questions asking people how much they feel they know about pensions, how much thought they have given to planning their own income in retirement, and if they have tried to calculate how much they need to save for retirement.
- M373_2**
- M373_3**
- M373_4** *Asked of those who are employees – self-employed and non-workers excluded.* We want to know what type of organisation they work for as different sectors tend to have different types of pension arrangements for their employees.
- M373_5 to M373_7** Asks about whether respondents are currently contributing to a pension, and if so, what type of pension
- M373_8** Many respondents will not be currently contributing to a pension – we would like to know why.
- M373_9 & M373_10** Respondents may be saving some money towards their retirement, whether or not they have a pension. NB we are only interested in savings specifically for retirement at this question, not general saving. Whether they are saving or have a pension or not, we would also like to know if they think they are doing the right amount of saving for retirement at the moment.
- M373_12 to M373_15** Younger respondents especially may find it difficult to answer 'At what age do you expect to retire.' We are aware of the potential problem here and would like to ask you to encourage an answer if possible, but if respondents really don't know then enter as a Don't Know.
Similarly, younger people may well not be able to answer the question about their main source of income in retirement. Again, please encourage an answer if possible, but if respondents really don't know then enter as a Don't Know.
- M373_16 & M373_17** People who have few retirement plans or have given it little thought are likely to find these questions tricky. Please ask the questions anyway as some of these people may be able to answer, and we are interested in their answers. Please enter Don't Know if people are unable to answer.
- M373_18 & M373_19** These questions ask the respondent to imagine that they are currently at retirement age, and in the situation they would expect to be in at that age (e.g. possibly having fewer outgoings due to a paid-off mortgage, less active social life, no dependent children – but this will vary from person to person). In that situation, how much do they think they would need as an absolute minimum, and how much to be comfortable.
- M373_20** Some respondents may find this a sensitive question. We are asking it because previous research has shown that people generally underestimate the length of time they will be retired for (i.e. people's life expectancy is longer than they think it will be). The Pensions Commission are interested in the difference between people's expectation of the length of retirement, and their actual likely length of retirement, as this clearly has implications for pension planning.

M373_21 & M373_22 Ask about any changes to retirement plans

M373_23 Opinion question asking about peoples' preferences re enjoying money now vs saving for retirement.
